As an environmental engineer, Hugo Martinez Cazon has always put together his love for history with his vocation. His Latin American background brings a different perspective to the work he's done researching Vermont's history. With a love for his adopted home, Hugo has been uncovering Vermont's forgotten gems such as the first international ice hockey game played on Lake Champlain in Burlington in 1886, and the lost ravine that at one time was a branch of the Winooski River that flowed through what is now the city of Burlington into Lake Champlain. The presentation at Morrystown Memorial Library will focus on the breakthrough inventions in photography by the Lumiere Brothers of Lyon, France and how they found a place in Burlington at the beginning of the 20th century.

Meet Simone Cormier, a Lamoille Neighbor member



One thing you might find impressive about Simone is that in 1949, before she was even 18, she came to Morrisville to work as a bookkeeper at the Union Bank. She had grown up on a farm in Richford. She stayed at the Union Bank until 1969 when she went to work for Concord Manufacturing on Harrel Street doing general ledger bookkeeping.

She enjoyed her high school years - playing on the girls' basketball team (she still has her "letter"), taking Home Economics (the class had a good laugh when the teacher tried to make pea soup with fresh green peas), and learning to write in French which she could not do despite being able to read and speak the language.

Simone met her husband at the bowling alley where folks often went to watch the bowlers for entertainment. The young couple lived with family while saving for the purchase of the home she still lives in. They both worked full time over the years, sometimes communicating with notes left on the kitchen table as she worked days and her husband worked nights. He retired at age 62 and she soon followed at age 56. Together they enjoyed summers on Lake Elmore. Winters were for snow machines or cross-country skis. They also loved bus tours to the Eastern U.S. and Canada.

When asked what events played a part in shaping her life, she responded, "the FDR administration - it got the economy back on track." Simone is 91 now and believes that her long life is attributable to "hardy stock." Her advice for a happy life is to "eat well and sleep well." "Good friends help too!"

Simone has always enjoyed her life and "has done what I wanted to do." She became an artist at 20 years old and is still creating beautiful paintings and collages which she gives away to friends and relatives, as well as to the community. You have probably seen her work on a wall somewhere around town.

For entertainment, Simone watches the History Channel nightly on TV. Otherwise, she is not a fan of modern technology. Her message to young folks is to "learn how to cook, learn how to budget and keep a checkbook, and develop your verbal and writing skills." She is proud to be a Catholic and advises those who worry about the future that "God will take care of us, whatever happens."

The ABLE Library is a free talking book and braille library service. They serve people with low vision or blindness. They also serve patrons with a physical or print disability that keeps them from being able to read standard print. They help patrons of all ages access books in a format that fits their reading needs.

The ABLE Library is part of the Vermont Department of Libraries.

The ABLE Library gives patrons digital talking book players that are free to use with digital talking books from the National Library Service. The players and the audio book cartridges are sent through the mail, are easy to use, and library staff can help patrons learn how to operate them.

If you would like to become a member of the ABLE Library, you will need to fill out an application. You will also need to have someone sign your application to certify your eligibility as needing the service. The application has the list of professionals who can sign as a certifying authority. 


Seven of us had a gorgeous full moon snowshoe on March 6th.
