Meet Eleanor

Eleanor Ahlers turned 94 this past August. And has been a member of Lamoille Neighbors since 2020. I got to know Eleanor as one of her volunteer drivers and through her participation in the “Everyone Has a Story to Tell” program last winter. I admire her energy, dedication, passion and sense of humor.

Eleanor was born on August 15, 1929, in Townsend, MA, where she grew up. She loved to sew, and her dream was to be a fashion designer, however, that was not to be. She left school at the end of junior year in order to help support her family, then married at 19 - “I was the old maid of my class”- and had children. Her husband was originally from Vermont, and in 1956 they moved to Morrisville.

Eleanor has always had a deep love of children. Following a separation from her husband, at age 35, Eleanor went to Johnson State College and got a teaching degree in Elementary Education. She was hired to teach in Barton, VT. “I learned more in that first year about teaching

than I ever did in college.” Her favorite grade was second grade. Eleanor loved teaching “because children are so forgiving.”

In 1976, Eleanor met and married her second husband, an executive in Gardner, MA. They moved back and forth between Barton and MA until 1989, when they settled in the West Boylston, MA area. Eleanor continued teaching during this time until her husband’s deteriorating health necessitated her caring for him full-time. After he died, she moved back to Vermont and now lives in Hyde Park.

Eleanor’s motto is “Be kind.” When asked for words of advice, she offered “When you pick something up, put it back where you found it,” and “If you can’t say something nice about someone, don’t say anything at all.”

Travel is one of Eleanor’s passions. She has visited Spain, Italy, and Turkey as well as traveled in the United States. She still vacations in Maine every summer and this year ventured to Tennessee with her daughter for a gathering of five generations of her family.

Eleanor started writing when she was 10 or 12 and continues to this day. She hopes to complete her autobiography soon, and shared a wonderful, humorous story about her stage debut as part of the writing component of “Everyone Has a Story to Tell” with the group.

What does Lamoille Neighbors mean to Eleanor? It has enabled her to make new friends and, most importantly, to stay in her home In Sterling View. She told me that it is the best thing that ever happened to her.
