Bernie has fascinating photos to share and, interspersed with these visuals, he will offer thoughts on why he finds insect watching rewarding. From close observation grows understanding and caring. ### Maggie Stewart, Lamoille Neighbors Member

Maggie was born in December 1941 five days after Pearl Harbor, 82 years ago. She was born in Burlington, Vermont. Her family moved to Johnson when Maggie was 6 years old. Her given name is Marguerite, but some of her cousins dubbed her "Maggie", and that name stuck, much to her mother's dismay.

She was one of eleven children, eight of whom survived. Her father passed away when she was 13 years old. After that, her mother Gladys worked various jobs and figured out how to keep her family together and provide for them. She kept journals telling about many of the times and events in the family's life.

Maggie and her sisters and brothers all had to learn how to work when they were young. As soon as they were able, each one learned to do small jobs to support the family. They developed a work ethic that has been an important part of their lives. One

summer Maggie and one of her brothers walked several miles to a nearby farm to pick vegetables. Other summers they were "farmed out". This meant that they lived and worked on farms farther from home. She says this was "actually fun". She learned new things and got to meet different people.

When she was thirteen Maggie attended the Ithiel Falls Camp. This had a profound effect on her life. Her belief in God and the Trinity has shaped her life. As an adult, being a member of the First Congregational Church in North Hyde Park helped define her spiritual life. She notes, "We grew with the Church and we grew old with the Church".

After high school, Maggie worked at Copley Hospital for three years. During that time, she met Dexter Stewart. Two years later, they got married in Hyde Park. Maggie and Dexter rented their first house, and six months later they bought the farm where they lived and brought up their children.

Dexter and Maggie were blessed with two children, Danny and Sandi. Maggie is grateful that their children grew up knowing they had parents and grandparents who loved them. Dexter's parents and Maggie's mother played an important part in the family's life.

They started their married life on the farm with 250 chickens and an egg business.

After leaving the egg business in 1968, they bought the general store in North Hyde Park and ran the Stewart's General Store for three and a half years.



When they sold the store, Maggie began to work as an early childhood teacher for the Lamoille North Supervisory Union's first Chapter I Preschool Program. She visited local homes, providing educational activities to parents and children. This was one of the first-of-its-kind home-based programs in Vermont. This was a dream job for Maggie; being with children was "her thing". She loved everything about being with the children and their parents: playing, cooking, reading, visiting.

As an early educator, Maggie met and worked with a great team of home-based early educators, supervised by the Education Department at Johnson State College. Some of these colleagues became lifelong friends. Many people in Hyde Park have fond memories of Miss Maggie going to their homes when they were small children. This job entailed continual training, including classes at Community College. She retired in 2000.

Danny died in an automobile accident in February 1984 when he was 20 years old. This was a great sadness for the entire family. Maggie joined a grief sharing group, and later started another grief sharing group for parents who had lost a child. People joined who had lost a child many years before but who hadn't had a place to talk about their grief.

Dexter passed away in June 2016. He had developed dementia nine years before that. He spent his final years in a nursing home. He had a great sense of humor that endeared him to many people and occasionally drove Maggie crazy. He was a kind man who was always ready to help anyone in need.

When she reflects on how she has changed over the years, Maggie notes that when she was young, she was very naive. It took years for her to learn that she could actually stand up for herself. Maggie started writing in journals when she got married. She has made the time to write throughout her adult life, composing poetry or reflecting life in her writings. In addition to writing, Maggie enjoys painting. She has taken classes in acrylic painting and watercolors.

Maggie especially enjoys getting together with her family and spending time with her 2 1/2-, year-old great, great granddaughter. She has two granddaughters, four great grandchildren and one great, great granddaughter. She loves getting together with friends. She likes being part of her church and joining Lamoille Neighbors activities and events. Maggie is most proud of her daughter Sandi. Although Sandi has experienced many challenges in her life, she has always been there for her mother.

Maggie's secret for a happy life: never give-up, see the best in people, and keep your sense of humor!

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
